



Poverty Rate, 2005-2009









How much domestic violence occurs in New Mexico?




Rate of Domestic Violence, 2009








Where Are Children At Risk Based On % Of Families In Poverty?



Families Under 100% of Federal Poverty Level, 2008












Families Receiving Home Visits









How many high quality licensed child care facilities are there in New Mexico?











Are there high quality Child Care programs in the areas most at risk in Albuquerque?




Combined Risk Factor Index









Las Cruces - licensed vs. registered child care facilities


